### Thoughts on Sewer Usage

- 1. Only water and body waste are to go into our waste disposal system (i.e. sinks and toilets.
- 2. Laundry should be done on alternating days during the week. Try doing one load every other day as opposed to 3 to 4 loads every Monday morning.
- 3. Be aware of the Laundry/Cleaning Supplies that you use. Excessive amounts of bleach, drain cleaners etc. are NOT good for our system.
- 4. NEVER put egg shells, coffee grounds, bones, potato peelings, grease etc. in your garbage disposal. These and all other food/cooking items are to be disposed of in your trash.
- 5. Disposable diapers, condoms, female hygiene items, cat litter, sanitary wipes, paper towels, handi-wipes, cigarette butts, sponges, even facial tissues are NOT to be put in your toilet
- 6. Our system is used by each of us. There is NO ALTERNATIVE. Thanks for your help.

Know Your Neighbor - This month we feature Tecumseh Trail's Ruth Percell



We continue our new feature this month for our Smoke Signal. Tippy has many interesting residents, and so many have fascinating stories that we would like to share in our newsletter. Ruth was born in Abancay, in southern Peru in 1941, the 7th of 8 children; her father was 1 of 13. Her father was a dreamer, involved in Peruvian politics, and very prosperous, but when Ruth was young, his fortunes changed as he became out of favour as the political climate shifted. He worked with archaeological projects, exploring Incan culture and ruins, including **Machu Picchu**. In fact, he found the original water source for that site, and then led his colleagues to **Huayana Picchu**, which was at an even higher elevation of over 8,900 feet,

almost 1,000 feet higher than Machu Picchu. This impressive discovery happened before Ruth's birth, when the family lived in the area. Ruth's eyes glowed with pride when she told me of her father's accomplishments.

When Ruth was 6, the family moved to Cusco, near Machu Picchu in the Peruvian Andes, where Ruth grew up. She spent a lot of her childhood visiting her sister's farm nearby, and got to know many of the indigenous people living in the area where she learned their language of Quechua, which descended from the original Incans. While there, Ruth also developed her knowledge and love of plants and animals.

She married just before her 18th birthday, and began studying to become a Physical Education Teacher, which was her husband's career. She loved many sports, but soon found she was pregnant and had to return to Cusco. By the age of 21, she had a second son. She was able to complete her training and worked as a Teacher for several years, and had her third son 3 years later. She was able to continue working back in her hometown of Abancay with the help of two aboriginal girls who called her "Mama"; they were with the family for 10 years.

After yet another move to Trujillo in Northern Peru, the marriage ended, her husband had not treated Ruth very well and the Peruvian legal system was not supportive of the young single mother. She decided to go to one of her older sisters who lived in New York City for help, but could only take one of her three boys with her because of resistance from her soon to be ex-husband. While in New York, she met her sister's friend, an older widower named Danny Percell, a Jewish immigrant from Russia. Ruth worked whatever jobs she could such as sewing, hairdressing, house cleaning and babysitting in order to save some money so she could reunite with her other boys. With help from several members of her family, after a harrowing trip back to Peru, she was able to bring all her boys back to New York and was able to marry Danny, who helped her raise her sons. Danny was a piano tuner, and worked for several famous musicians and orchestras in Manhattan. Ruth and Danny also were able to attend many operas and concerts during that time.

Five years passed, and Ruth wanted her boys to have a better sense of their culture, so she decided to return to Peru, sadly leaving Danny behind, as there was not enough work for him in Peru. They divorced, and Ruth worked very hard to raise her sons alone and see they got a good education. Two became Industrial Engineers and the third studied Hotel Management. With all three established, Ruth decided to travel the world for a few years spending a lot of time in Europe, concentrating on Italy, and a long stay in the Canary Islands, eventually returning to Peru, in time for her sons to marry and start their own families.

Her youngest son and his family eventually decided to emigrate to Canada (there were hardly any earthquakes, and no electrical and water shortages which were regular occurrences in Peru) and moved to Toronto in the early 1990s, followed a few years later by both his brothers. Ruth, left alone in Peru, decided to joint them in Canada, but unfortunately, she could not stay permanently. She made her way back to New York and reconnected with Danny, and they re-married. Danny passed away in 2005, and Ruth moved to Vancouver, Canada, where two of her sons were living. This time the Canadian authorities let her stay.

In 2013, Ruth was invited to visit her niece in Sarasota, and fell in love with our beautiful city, so she decided to stay and bought her Condo in Tippecanoe. She has created lovely gardens in her lanai and backyard, and enjoys helping some of her neighbors with their gardening projects. She still spends time visiting her sons and their families in Vancouver and Ottawa, but considers Sarasota her home.
